| Stitch Used | Multiples that include first and last st in a row. | Where to Start | Multiple with first and last st of each row not included. | Where to Start |

| Single Crochet | Add 1 | Start 2nd chain from hook. | Add 3 | Start 2nd chain from hook. 1 stand alone sc on each side to put multiple in balance in between. |
| Half Double Crochet | Add 1 | Start 3rd chain from hook. Ch skipped counts as first hdc. | Add 3 | Start 3rd chain from hook. 1 stand alone hdc on each side. |
| Double Crochet | Add 2 | Start 4th chain from hook. Ch skipped counts as first dc. | Add 4 | Start 4th chain from hook. 1 stand alone dc on each side. |
| Treble Crochet | Add 3 | Start 5th chain from hook. Ch skipped counts as first tr. | Add 5 | Start 5th chain from hook. 1 stand alone tr on each side. |

Additional Chains


Multiples are in sets where each multiple is part of the first and last stitch.

Additional Chains


First and last stitches are not included into the multiple but a stand alone edge.
